Justice, mercy, and faithfulness are peoplerelated. Tithing the mint and dill and cumin is not. The Pharisees were so meticulous that they would tithe the single plants from their garden, but were cruel, arrogant, and unjust toward others.

That spirit is not dead. Unfortunately, there are those in the church who wear the right clothes, they put their check in the offering plate each week, they attend both times on Sunday, yet they are rude to the waitress at lunch. They are a pompous jerk at work. They act like a fool at the basketball game as they yell and scream at the refs and the coach. They have all the outward actions of religion on Sunday, yet their actions during the week are completely irreligious. The externals mean nothing if the heart isn't right.

No matter how valid our traditions may seem, they are completely worthless if they ignore the greater virtues.

NOT AN EITHER/OR PROPOSITION

According to Scripture, our Christian maturity is demonstrated, at least in part, by our willingness to speak the truth in love. We show ourselves as godly grownups, not merely by speaking truth, but by doing so "in love," which results in our growing up "in all things into Him who is the head - Christ" (Ephesians 4:14.15).

Knowledge may know what to say, but wisdom knows whether, when, and how to say it. There's a big difference between winning the argument and winning the man.

As someone once said, "If to correct you must humiliate, you don't know how to teach."



Our Lord was a walking, talking demonstration of "truth in love." He never refused to speak with someone He disagreed with. He listened. He waited to hear the question before giving His answer. He never got into shouting matches with His enemies. He never started or spread ugly, unfounded rumors about others, even those who were actively working against Him. He never attempted to silence His critics by means of mean-spirited barbs, baseless accusations, or snarky jabs of sarcasm.

Yes, if you have any doubt what speaking the truth in love looks like, take a good, hard look at Jesus!

The words of David Lipscomb are especially relevant: "Never stir up prejudice in the people. That will prevent their seeing the truth with impartiality and fairness. It does them wrong and defeats the end in view. There is a very great danger in making ourselves sectarians while opposing sectarians. Present the truth in as kind and gentle, yet as earnest, spirit as possible. Never make fun of any teacher regardless of the ridiculousness of his teaching. Never question the honesty of any preacher. Never attack the man, but show from the scriptures how the doctrine that man is preaching cannot be sustained. Every faithful preacher, from the day of Pentecost until today, has used the same approach. Don't be radical in an ugly sense. Be balanced in your preaching."

Remember this: "Truth in love" has never been an either/or proposition.

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THE EMPTY TOMB

Like all other Christians, there was a time in my life that I had to intellectually decide if the resurrection of Jesus actually took place. The reason this is such a critical question is because the entire claim of Christianity rests solely on this historical event. Paul himself conceded the fact that if our Lord's resurrection did not take place, Christianity is a false religion offering false hope (cf. 1 Corinthians 15:13-19). I, like so many others before me, had to weigh the evidence and determine whether or not I would commit my life to this claim. When I looked at the evidence, the choice was a simple one to make.

The lines of evidence that Jesus rose from the dead are many. The empty tomb must be seriously considered Who opened the tomb? Jesus? followers had not the opportunity and his enemies had not the motive. Yet the great stone was rolled away and the tomb stood wide open. But not only this, the open tomb was empty.

We are also told that the headband was rolled up and placed precisely and neatly by itself; it was not hastily removed and thrown to the ground but neatly folded. Yet, if the tomb was opened and vacated but Jesus was never seen again, the claim of resurrection would have been less credible. But hundreds of people claimed to have seen the risen Christ. Some even testified that they ate and drank with him after He

rose from the dead. Jesus own apostles were persecuted and imprisoned (most were executed) for their claims, yet they never recanted nor repudiated what they had seen. The very existence of Christianity nearly 2000 years later - with those magnificent memorials such as the Lord's Supper and the Lord's Day - cannot be brushed aside as irrelevant. All the facts mentioned above demand explanation. Only the resurrection of Jesus from that tomb agrees with every fact. I have always stood secure in my personal, lifechanging decision to follow the One who obviously rose from the tomb.

A wise king seeks advisors who will tell the truth, whereas a foolish ruler wants yes men who will tell him what he wants to hear. Entirely too often the fools carry the day, as exemplified by King Jehoram of Israel. Because of Israel's persistent
